1. Introduction

During a three-month period in 2017 Right Service Right Time (RSRT) partnered with the University of Canterbury Internship Programme to undertake a project that mapped the community-based supports available in the various Christchurch neighbourhoods in which families/whānau reside.

There was a three-fold purpose to this project:

- Increase the profile of Christchurch's wellbeing services and supports by creating a representation of helping resources (from the community/voluntary and informal sectors) available for families/whānau across defined neighbourhoods within Christchurch
- Enhance RSRT's ability to mobilise and improve the accessibility of the more informal community-based helping resources (that together with the clinical services) required to meet identified needs of local children, young people and their families/whānau
- Establish connections between families/whānau and the helping resources within their own neighbourhoods that meet their identified goals and needs.

Data for this project was sourced from a range of sources including: websites, reports and social service brochures. This data has been presented in geographically-defined areas and by categories of need.

The geographically-defined areas selected for this project were 6 of the 7 Christchurch City Council Community Board boundaries confirmed by the Local Government Commission in 2016. These areas are illustrated in the following graphic and listed below:

- Fendalton / Waimari / Harewood
- Papanui / Innes
- Burwood / Coastal
- Halswell / Hornby / Riccarton
- Spreydon / Cashmere
- Central / Heathcote / Linwood




Figure 1: Christchurch City Council Community Board Boundaries 2016

Figure 2: Fendalton Ward Map



Figure 3: Waimari Ward Map



Figure 4: Harewood Ward Map



Figure 5: Papanui Ward Map



Figure 6: Innes Ward Map



Figure 7: Burwood Ward Map



Figure 8: Coastal Ward Map



Figure 9: Spreydon Ward Map



Figure 10: Cashmere Ward Map



Figure 11: Linwood Ward Map



Figure 12: Central Ward Map



Figure 13: Heathcote Ward Map





Figure 14: Halswell Ward Map



Figure 15: Hornby Ward Map



Figure 16: Riccarton Ward Map


